Can you believe we are almost at the end of the first semester? Where does the time go? With the change in semester, weather, and seasons upon us, here are a few reminders and things to keep in mind this month!

Winter MAP Testing – K-6 students will be MAP testing the week of December 4th. MAP stands for "Measures of Academic Progress". The data from MAP testing is used to adjust instruction, WIN groups, and other services, so it's important that students try their best and therefore give us accurate data to work with. A good night's rest and a good breakfast are important prior to MAP testing!

Home Games and Events – A reminder as we start the Winter sports season that students should not be wandering unattended in the building during home events. Students should be sitting in the gym enjoying the game and supporting our teams! Younger students should be seated with their parents. We appreciate your attention to this matter- it means that staff can enjoy the game as well and not have to "police" the back gym, band hallway, and other parts of the building.

Dress for the Weather! – Please make sure your student is dressed appropriately for the weather each day. This includes a winter coat if it is cold outside. PK-6 students will have outdoor recess unless it is dangerously cold. Please don't let students of any age wear shorts to school when it is cold outside. If there would be a need to evacuate the building in extreme cold, shorts would not be enough to protect a student from the elements. We are blessed to have many people in our community willing to provide for those in need! If you are in need of a coat for your student, please contact the school.

School Closing Information – As the season changes, it won't be long now before the snow starts to fly! Word Games Strengthen Writing Skills


If your child has trouble forming and punctuating sentences, encourage practice by turning writing into a game.

Here are two games to play to exercise writing skills:

- 1. Fill-in-the-Blanks. Review the different parts of speech and write a story with missing words. For example: "The girl stepped on a ___ (noun)." Take turns filling in the blanks. You can help by saying things like, "A noun is a person, place or thing. I'll choose the word pie!" Make the words as silly as you'd like. Then read the story aloud.
- 2. Punctuation Point. Write a short story without punctuation. Then read it together. It's challenging! This illustrates how important punctuation is for writing to be clear.

Now edit the story, adding punctuation that makes it easy (or funny) to read. Suggest that your child write a story for you to punctuate. Discuss why you chose—or didn't choose—certain punctuation marks.

Talk to Your Child About Showing Respect for Teachers, Classmates

Respectful behavior is vital for education. When students show respect for teachers and classmates, they help create the positive academic environment all children need to be successful learners.

Encourage your child to:

- Address the teacher by name. Simply saying "Good morning, Mrs. Jones" is an easy way to show respect.
- Be courteous. Your child should say please and thank you to the teacher and classmates.
- Raise a hand. When students avoid interrupting and wait to be called on, they demonstrate respect for others.
- Do what's expected. Everyone in the class has a job to do. If the teacher doesn't plan any lessons, no one can learn anything. If students don't do their jobs—completing assignments, listening to others—it makes it more difficult to learn.
- Listen to the teacher's comments. Teachers want students to learn and improve. That means they have to point out mistakes. Students do much better in school when they can recognize and accept constructive feedback.

Los juegos de palabras fortalecen la escritura


Si su hijo tiene dificultades para formar o puntuar oraciones, anímelo a practicar convirtiendo la escritura en un juego.

Estos son dos juegos a los que podrían jugar para poner en práctica las habilidades de escritura:

- 1. Completar los espacios en blanco. Repasen diferentes categorías gramaticales y escriban un cuento con las palabras faltantes. Por ejemplo: "La niña pisó un __ (sustantivo)". Túrnense para completar los espacios en blanco. Puede ayudar a su hijo diciendo cosas como "Un sustantivo es una persona, un lugar o una cosa. ¡Escojo la palabra pastel!" Elija palabras tan alocadas como lo desee. Luego, lea el cuento en voz alta.
- 2. Signo de puntuación. Escriban un cuento sin puntuación. Luego, léanlo juntos. ¡Es difícil! Esto ilustra lo importante que es la puntuación para que la escritura sea clara.

Ahora, editen el cuento y agreguen la puntuación de manera que sea fácil (o divertido) de leer. Sugiérale a su hijo que escriba un cuento para que usted le coloque la puntuación. Comenten por qué escogió — o no escogió — ciertos signos de puntuación.

Hable con su hijo sobre el respeto a sus maestros y compañeros

El respeto es esencial para la educación. Cuando los estudiantes muestran respeto por sus maestros y compañeros, pueden construir el ambiente académico positivo que necesitan todos los niños para aprender con éxito.

Anime a su hijo a:

- Llamar a su maestro por su nombre. Simplemente decir "Buen día, Sra. Jones" es una manera fácil de mostrar respeto.
 - Ser cortés. Su hijo debería decirles por favor y gracias al maestro y a sus compañeros.
- Levantar la mano. Cuando los estudiantes evitan interrumpir y esperan a que los llamen, demuestran respeto por los demás.
- Hacer lo que se espera de él. Todos los miembros de la clase tienen una tarea que hacer. Si el maestro no planifica las lecciones, nadie puede aprender nada. Si los estudiantes no hacen su trabajo —hacer trabajos, escuchar a los demás—, es más difícil que aprendan.
- Escuchar los comentarios del maestro. Los maestros quieren que los estudiantes aprendan y mejoren. Eso significa que tienen que señalarles sus errores. A los estudiantes les irá mucho mejor en la escuela si pueden reconocer y aceptar los comentarios constructivos.

Counselor's Corner Mrs. Choyeski December 2023

Congratulations to Hailey Schweitzer! Hailey has been named a finalist for Believers & Achievers through the Nebraska Schools Activity Association (NSAA). Believers & Achievers is a state-wide program designed to give recognition to Nebraska's future leaders. Every high school in the state of Nebraska has the opportunity to nominate up to four seniors for this recognition. Of all the state-wide nominations, 48 students are chosen as finalists. Hailey will be recognized at the Girls State Basketball Tournament on Saturday, March 2nd at halftime of the 1:00 Class B Championship game. 8 of the 48 finalists will receive a \$500 scholarship from Currency to use at a college or university of their choice.

High School:

Students who want to change their schedule for second semester must talk to Mrs. Choyeski by Friday, December 8. Drop/Add forms must be turned in *on or before December 19 by 3:30 p.m.* To allow for time to process all schedule changes before break, *forms will not be accepted after this deadline*.

Senior parents – The FAFSA will open by the end of December for students who plan to attend college during the 2024-25 school year. The FAFSA is used to award scholarships, grants, and student loans. A representative from EducationQuest came to speak with parents and students on Thursday, October 12 about the FAFSA. If you were not able to attend, but would like information please let me know.

Just a reminder, make sure create your FSA ID (parents and student) so you are prepared once the application opens. You will need to allow several days for the verification process once the ID is created. Also, review the FAFSA Checklist to make sure all your materials are collected before filing the FAFSA. This information was available in a packet which was handed out by the FAFSA representative on October 12. This information has also been emailed to senior parents. If you are needing this information, please contact Mrs. Choyeski.

Senior parents – A representative from EducationQuest will return to DPS on Thursday, February 8 for FAFSA Completion Day. The purpose of this day is to help parents and students with the FAFSA application. Individual times will be available for parents and students to meet with the representative for assistance. More information will be available after the holiday break.


