Some members of this class also participated in County Government Day at Wilber.

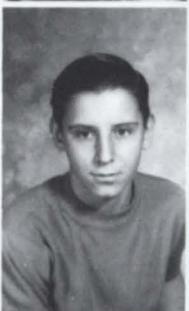

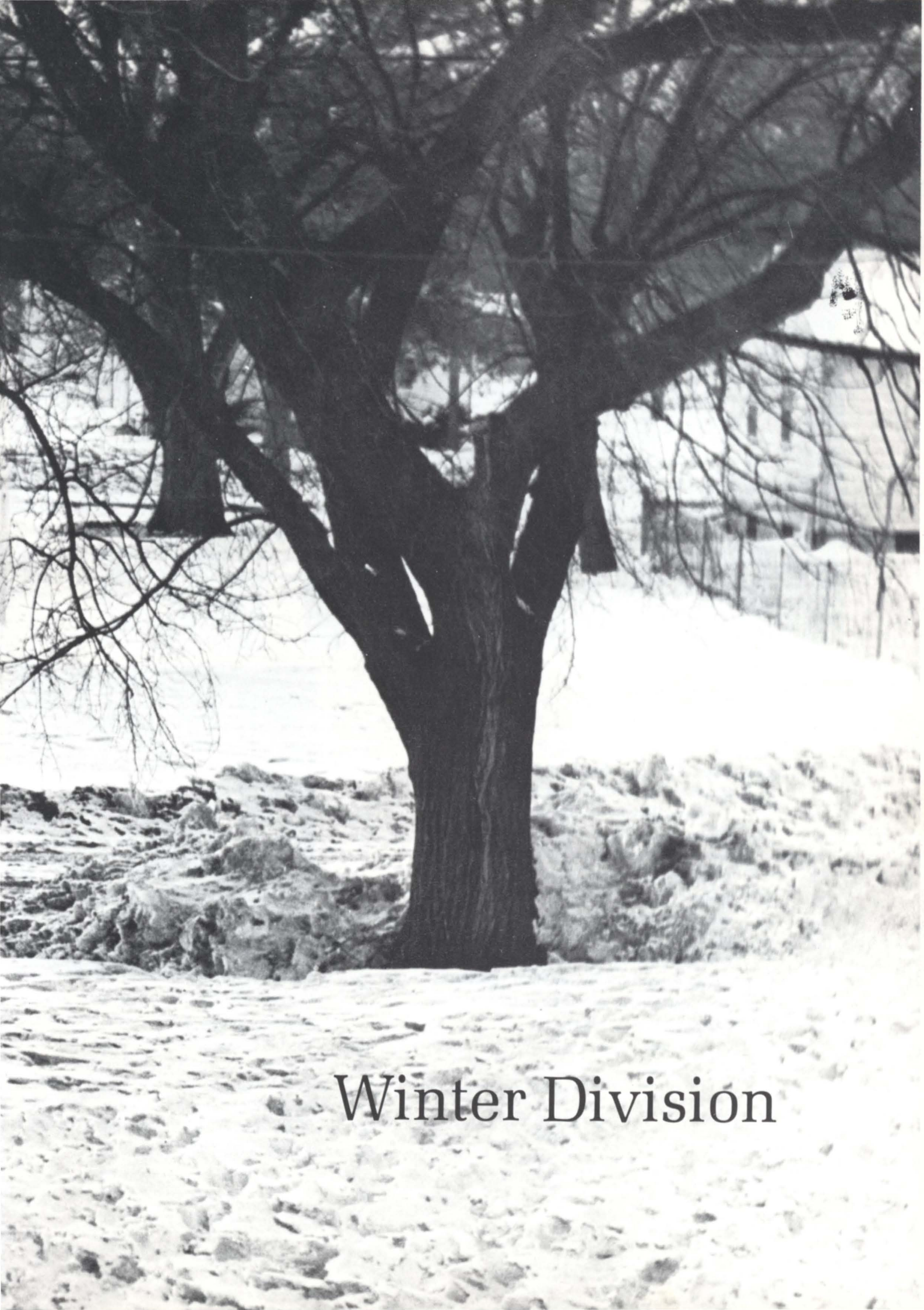
Hard Work, Fun, and Laughter Produced Class Plays

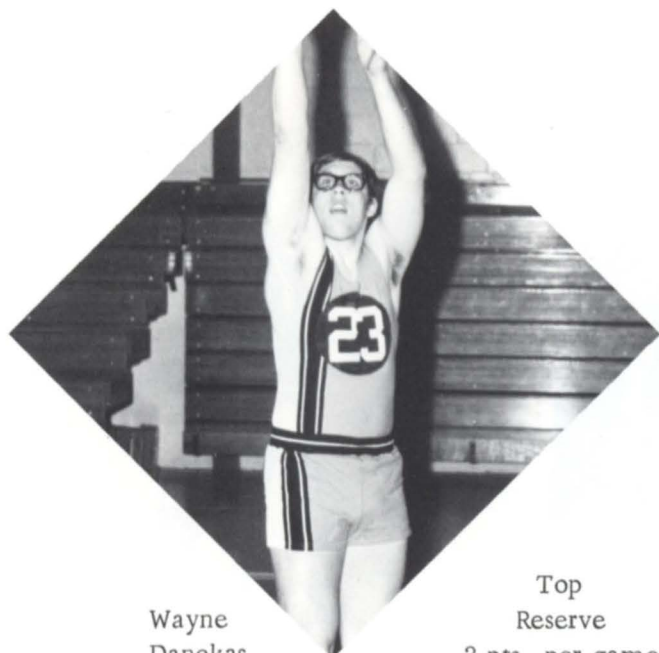

Roundballers Captured Conference Tri-Championship



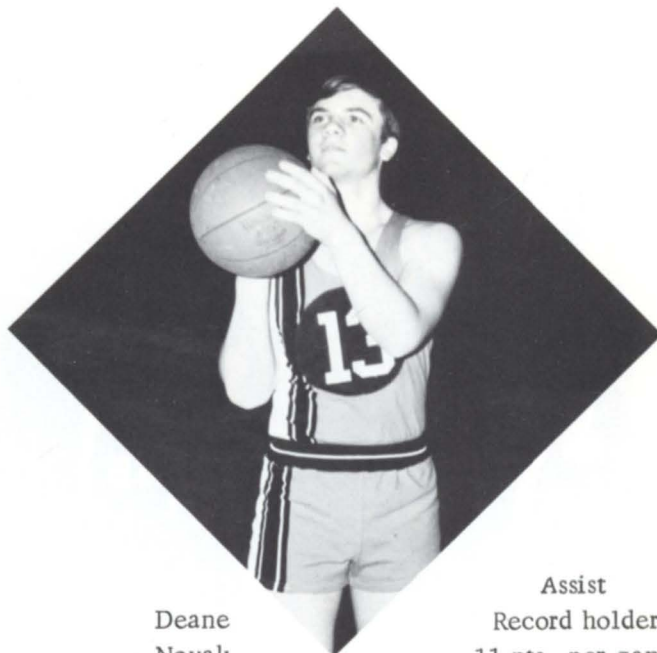
The basketball team got off to a fast start in winning six straight games; including victories over archrivals Milligan and Shickley.
