As you all know, I married John Potter in the fall of 1957. Getting married that young may not have been right for everyone, but it's worked for me. Fifty years later, we're still together and life hasn't treated us too badly.

We began our life together in a small apartment in Lincoln and I worked as clerical support for the Nebraska Department of Roads. John was drafted in 1958 and was sent to Fort Hood, Texas. I joined him there for his last eight weeks of training. Following basics, John was stationed in Germany and I eventually joined him there. Between Texas and Germany, I lived and worked in New York in a brokerage house on Wall Street. A couple we became acquainted with in Texas were from Brooklyn and Marge and I decided to travel to Europe together, thus the move to NY. Although I only spent a few months there, I loved it. Marge and I flew to Germany in August of 1959, she to Stuttgart and I to Fuerth (just outside of Nuernberg). John and I remained there until February of 1961 when we returned to Lincoln.

John took a job at the Dorchester Co-op that year and we moved back to Dorchester in the summer of 1961. I took the job of school secretary for a period of time.

In September of 1965 we were blessed with a daughter, Cara Ellen. A son, John David, better known as Jack, was born in August of 1967.

I was the bookkeeper there until late fall of 99 when I thought I'd give retirement a try. I guess I wasn't ready to be quite that idle, so took a part time job as church secretary for the Methodist Churches of Friend and Dorchester. I held that position for six years until 2006 when I was diagnosed with colon cancer. Once again I did the chemotherapy treatments and thought I could beat it. In the summer of 07, the cancer reappeared. I am still doing chemotherapy and am thankful for each day that I am given.

John and I continue to enjoy living in the country and feel very fortunate to have our family near. Carey and Jack both live in Friend. Jack and Tiphanie are parents to our beautiful grandchildren, John Joseph (Joe) age 9 ½ and Kaitlin Rose (Kate) age 7. They all bring laughter and great joy to our lives.






