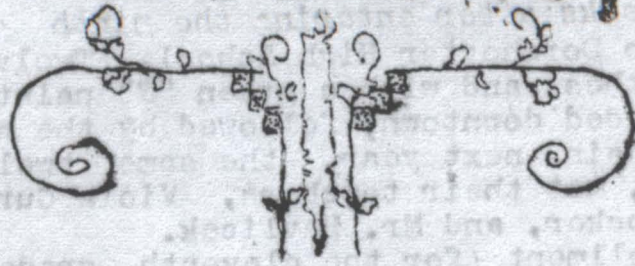

# Class History



In the fall of 1940 six bewildered youngsters marched obediently into the Dorchester School to meet their first teacher, Elsie Carlson. Those six youngsters were: Donna Lee Hayes, Virginia Jewett, LaVerne Mason, Dick Parks, Jerry Dean Cook, and Marilyn Simpson. Of the six only Marilyn Simpson has completed all twelve years at Dorchester.

Miss Carlson again met six youngsters the next year. The enrollment was different, however. We lost two members, Jerry Dean Cook and Virginia Jewett, and added two, Billy Harris and Charley Johnson. Those enrolled were: Billy Harris, Donna Hayes, Charley Johnson, Shirley LaVerne Mason, Dick Parks, and Marilyn Simpson.

Our third grade teacher was Rachel Weber. Karen Kenney and Donna Hayes joined us the third week of the first six weeks. Earl and Winnifred Richardson also joined us that year.

The enrollment in the fourth grade was seven. Our teacher for that year was Rachel Leach. Derald Siebert enrolled the fifth six weeks. Billy Harris was no longer with us; we were sorry to see him move to Oregon.

This left the following five as fifth graders: Marilyn Simpson, Karen Kenney, Charley Johnson, Winnifred Richardson, and Derald Siebert. LaVerne Mason, Dick Parks, and Earl Richardson were no longer with us. Our teacher was Delores Bernhardt.

Winnifred Richardson had moved to Fairbury so there were only four as we entered the sixth grade. The teacher for the first semester was Ardith Johnson. Blanche Aksemit was our teacher for the second semester.

In the fall of 1946 these same seven students climbed the stairs to the seventh grade. We were: Belva Arnold, Charley Johnson, Elvin Janda, Karen Kenney, Winnifred Richardson, Marilyn Simpson, and Dick Parks. The teacher was Gladys Gausman. Later, however, we had a new teacher, Clara Marren.

The same seven students returned next year as eighth graders under Florence Gray the first semester and Lorene Kohl the second semester.

In '48 ten freshmen eagerly climbed the stairs to high school--Belva Arnold, Charley Johnson, Elvin Janda, Karen Kenney, Winnifred Richardson, Marilyn Simpson, Harriett Plachy, Harold Plachy, Marilyn Fette, and Melva Harling. *Lick Pa* Janice Horky joined us the second semester and Grace Trabert enrolled the fourth week of the first six weeks. Our teachers were Wendell Snocker, Viola Curry, and Mae Deck Hiatt.



Three weeks after entering the ninth grade we were initiated into Dorchester High School. Twelve freshmen dressed in old clothes and with a green "F" painted on their foreheads, paraded downtown, followed by the seniors.

Back again next year, the same twelve students, now sophomores, met their teachers, Viola Curry, Mabel Lucado, Wendell Snocker, and Mr. Havlicek.

The enrollment for the eleventh grade was not quite as large as it was the year before. Charley Johnson and Winnifred Richardson dropped out. The teachers this year were Miss Vrbsky, Mrs. Bruening, Mr. Reid, Mr. Ashburn, and Mr. Havlicek.

As seniors, we are now ten. Graduating this year are Elvin Janda, Karen Kenney, Marilyn Simpson, Janice Horky, Dick Parks, Harriett Plachy, Harold Plachy, Melva Harling, Marilyn Fette, and Grace Trabert. Belva Arnold left the last part of the junior year. Our teachers now were Mrs. Nerud, Mrs. Simpkins, Mrs. Bruening, Mr. Ashburn, Mr. Reid, and Mr. Havlicek.

We wish to take this opportunity to thank the teachers who have so kindly helped us get our education so that we are prepared to go "Out of School Life into Life's School."

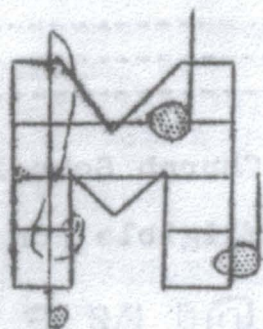

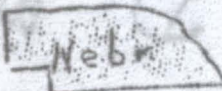

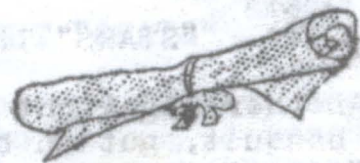
## OZARK TRIP CLIMAX

Whatever is said, he'll always agree.

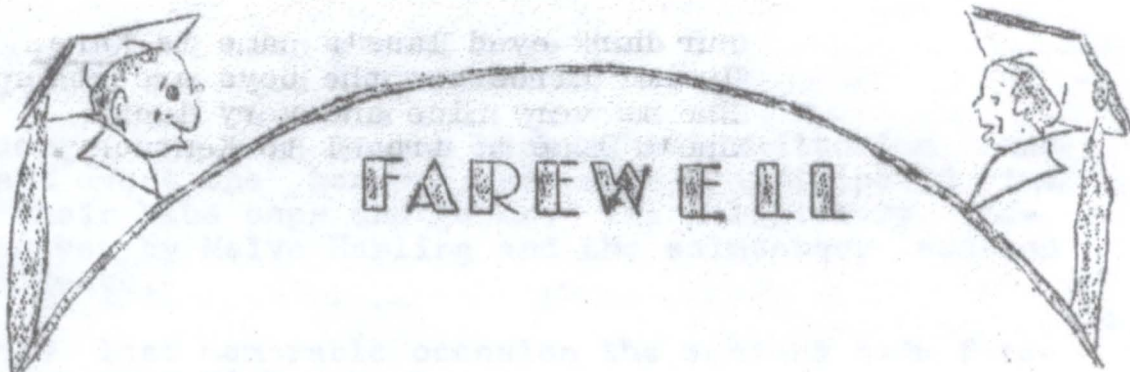
Next we have Harriett, who can really drive,

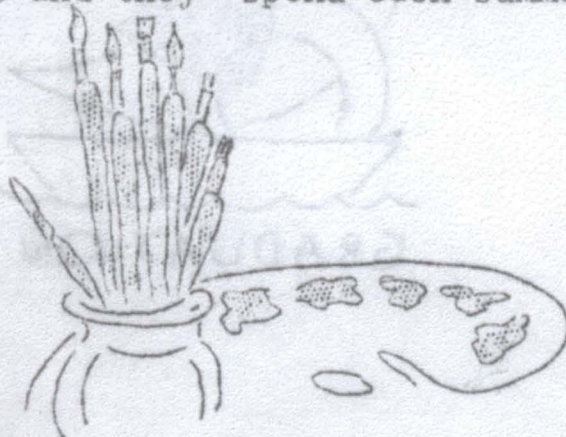
## GRACE TRABERT:

Members of the Board of Education, School Faculty, distinguished guests, fellow school mates, patrons and friends.


We of the senior class deem it a privilege indeed to be candidates representing the class of 1952.
