Class History

We were back again in the fall of '39 with sixteen students to meet our new teacher, Miss Dowle. Later in the year Miss Dowle left and Mrs. Einstien took over. We started this year with the same students. During the year Alta Axline left but returned to finish the year with us.

In September of 1940 fifteen students started to the third grade where we met Miss Rachel Weber as our new teacher. These students were Ada Jo Atkinson, Alta Mae Axline, Ronald Barton, Wilma Denny, Rogene Hayes. Betty Johnson, Roger Kennedy, Retha McReynolds, Ruth McReynolds, Claryce Ann Roberts, Winnie Sedlacek, Marilyn Sehnert, Roy Simpson, Dennis Swoboda, Keith Urban.

We gained Charles Parks, Jean Kahle, and Eugene Nichols. We lost Alta Mae Axline and Janet Selk.

In the fall of '41 we were back again with sixteen students to start the fourth grade. We again met Miss Rachel Weber as our teacher. The following students started the fourth grade: Ada Jo Atkinson, Ronald Barton, Wilma Denny, Rogene Hayes, Betty Johnson, Frances Johnson, Jean Kahle, Roger Kennedy, Retha McReynolds, Ruth McReynolds, Charles Parks, Claryce Ann Roberts, Winnie Sedlacek, Marilyn Sehnert, Roy Simpson, Keith Urban, We gained Alta Mae Axline and Frances Johnson.

In '42 we moved forward to the fifth grade where we met Miss Karr as our new teacher. We lost Ronald Barton, Rogene Hayes, Wilma Denny, Jean Kahle, Roger Kennedy and Keith Urban. We gained Sam Richardson.

We were back again in the fall of '43 with twelve students to start the sixth grade. We again met Miss Karr as our teacher. Those who started the sixth grade were Ada Jo Atkinson, Alta Mae Axline, Bill Hayes, Betty Johnson, Retha McReynolds, Ruth McReynolds, Charles Parks, Sam Richardson, Claryce Ann Roberts, Marilyn Sehnert, Roy Simpson. We gained Doris Eret and Doris Sebert. We lost Ada Jo Atkinson, Bill Hayes and Charles Parks.

In the fall of '44 we took our first trip upstairs where we met Mrs. Gladys Gausman as our seventh grade teacher. During the year we lost Claryce Roberts.

In '45 we again met Mrs. Gausman as our teacher. Ten students began the eighth grade. They were: Alta Axline, Doris Eret, Betty Johnson, Retha McReynolds, Ruth McReynolds, Sam Richardson, Doris Sebert, Marilyn Schnert, Roy Simpson. During the year we lost Doris Sebert, and Frances Johnson

Sixteen freshmen walked through the doors of the senior assembly for the first time in the fall of 1946. Those who met our new teachers, Supt. Dahl, Mr. Neuman, Mrs. Jonas, Miss Vrbsky, and Mrs. Burmaster were: Marian Andelt, Alta Axline, George Kasl, Jim Cerney, Doris Eret, Edith Harding, Jesse Harding, Betty Johnson, Gloria Luzum, Retha McReynolds, Ruth McReynolds, Charlotte Nerud, Gene Plouzek, Sam Richardson, Marilyn Sehnert, Gladys Vavra.

With thirteen students we were back again to start our sophomore year. Enrolled were Marian Andelt, Alta Axline, Jim Cerney, Doris Eret, Betty Johnson, Gloria Luzum, Retha McReynolds, Ruth McReynolds, Gene Plouzek, Claryce Roberts, Marilyn Sehnert, Gladys Vavra. We lost George Kasl, Edith Harding, Jesse Harding and Charlotte Nerud and gained Claryce Roberts.

Fourteen students started our mighty junior year. During this time we lost Doris Eret and gained Don Johnson and Rodney Helget.

After progressing through twelve years of gains and losses, twelve students started the senior year. They were Marian Andelt, Alta Axline, Jim Cerney, Rodney Helget, Betty Johnson, Donald Johnson, Gloria Luzum, Retha McReynolds, Ruth McReynolds, Gene Plouzek, Claryce Roberts, Gladys Vavra.

Of the sixteen students that started the first grade, Ruth and Retha McReynolds are the only two that finished all twelve years at D.H.S.

In the freshman year there were nine members of the class participating in the Declamatory Contest. All of them were entered in the humorous division.

In 1948 there were only three members of the class entered in the local dramatic contest. At the district contest at McCool Junction, the following ratings were received:

VAGUE BUT TRUE

Eighty-seven years ago when we were such happy mortals living our daily lives. Now we have lost all our earthly worries, but we will always remember the incidents of the past. For instance there was Jim Cerny, the friendly undertaker, who got all of his classmates' business. They left their last words with him.

Rodney Helget, the electrical engineer, died by his own invention, an electrical handshaker which got him by the neck and his last words were "Hangman's Boogie". We had a busy farmer, Gene Plouzek, who died of lack of work during a dry year. He was singing "Cool Water" when Jim arrived too late. Then we had a very busy office girl. It seems she, Marian Andelt, died when she fell to the floor. For you see she had just fallen from the boss's lap. Her last words were "Oh, Dear! What Can The Matter Be."

It really was too bad that Retha McReynolds, the nurse, couldn't have been around those days because if she had been we probably wouldn't have died so soon. Retha was trying to keep her mind on her work, when the scalpel slipped. She was humming "A Tisket a Tasket a Brown and Yellow Casket."

It seems time had lingered on and Jim was thinking that his business was very dead when one day Alta Axline, the school teacher, was brought in. It seems she was telling her pupils the poem "School Days" when suddenly she fell to the floor, never again to teach for the strain had been too much for her. Don Johnson, the great cowboy, died with his boots on. For he was riding a horse humming "Ghost Riders in the Sky" when he forgot to duck for a tree limb. He is still probably riding his horse strumming his harp instead of his guitar.

It seems that Gloria Luzum saw all of her class-mates because she provided the music for the funerals. Gloria gained her experience by playing in a band. She pounded the ivorys of the organ; over exerted, she died playing "Open Up Those Pearly Gates". Betty Johnson had a very natural death. She was sitting in a rocking chair singing "Old Folks At Home" to her husband.

We remember Gladys Vavra told us that she liked to drive fast. Later she joined Jimmy Linche's Death Dodgers. You would never guess what happened on one of her days off. She was riding a bicycle down a hill too fast, without using the handlebars when a tree suddenly appeared before her. She was singing "Daisy Belle", (A Bicycle Built For Two).

Ruth McReynolds was as you remember, always working on her bookkeeping. Well, we guess she never recovered from her attempt to complete it. She passed on singing "Maybe It's Because". We had a small class, but it seems the smallest was the last to die. Claryce Roberts lived to the age of ninety-eight. She was an entertainer at Bill's Nightclub. She passed on while playing the "Darktown Strutter's Ball".

In the fall of 1948 the juniors presented their production, "Saved By The Belle," sponsored by Mrs. Hiatt. The plot was centered on a college sorority. During the course of the evening the "Belle" became involved with a pugilist and a newspaper reporter. Bill Moser, a sophomore, helped to complete the cast.

In January 1950 the senior class, under the direction of Mr. Reid, presented a three-act comedy, "Call Me Darling." The plot centered on the homecoming of a lad who had run away to "sail the seven seas" and had the harrowing experience of being shipwrecked.

The seniors lived through their 8:00 A. M. practices and although Mr. Reid thought they never would learn the play, it was a success.

Athletics

This has concluded the first season in the revival of football in Dorchester. The Dorchester team played five games. The results are as follows: Milford 50 Dorchester 0, Fairmont 64 Dorchester 8, Western 52 Dorchester 32, Exeter 59 Dorchester 44, and Beaver Crossing 40 Dorchester 6. All team members will be back next year.

The Dorchester basketball club has finished the 49 and 50 season. Although this record is not very bright it provides hope for the future.

The results of the varsity squad were: Utica 33 Dorchester 24, Waco 41 Dorchester 31, Swanton 39 Dorchester 45, Garland 64 Dorchester 23, Beaver Crossing 52 Dorchester 23, Exeter 47 Dorchester 32, Milford 64 Dorchester 30, and Friend 66 Dorchester 15.

At the trailways tournament at Western, Dorchester lost to Milford by a score of 44 to 30. Milford then continued to win the crown with Beaver Crosing coming in second.

Some late season results of the varsity squad were Pleasant Dale 38 Dorchester 47, Milligan 44 Dorchester 36, Dewitt 42 Dorchester 45, and Fairmont 48 Dorchester 42.

At the district class D tournament at Dewitt, St. Joseph of Beatrice squeezed by Dorchester with a score of 31 to 32.










